CRUSADER



CRUSADES & CRUSADERS: A CONTINUED CONVERSATION

The name "Crusader" has spurned much controversy in the last couple of years. Does the name reflect the current values and statutes of the university? Does the name's historical connotations tarnish the reputation and purposes of NNU? Can we justifiably continue to keep the Crusader as our school mascot and moniker? Writers Joshua Walters and Eric Ostyn debate the issue further in an effort to bring their thoughts and opinions to the matter.

Eric: I don't think we should change the name because, if nothing else, it holds a special place in all of the alumni's minds. Everyone that has graduated from NNU knows that our mascot is the Crusader. Beyond the controversy surrounding the history of the subject matter, the Crusader name has become known first as the mascot of the school and secondly as a possibly offensive historical reference. Josh: That may be so, but does it follow that every NNU alumnus really looks back on our mascot positively? It's more likely that some alumni would be happy to see it changed, as would many people still on campus. Besides, it's the possibility of offense that makes our name so controversial. It carries many connotations that are predominantly negative.

Even though not all of the original crusaders fought for "wrong" reasons, the fact remains that some who claimed to fight for God acted in ways that were anything but Christ-like. If we want to present ourselves positively to the world as an institution of Christian love, the Crusader mascot seems like the wrong way to go about it.

Eric: Either way, here we are in 2016 as the Northwest Nazarene Crusaders. Who can say what the original intent was back when the mascot was introduced, but it has endured with the school for all these years. The meaning has evolved over time to the point where the focus is off of the historical context and now on our proven athletic department and other off-campus events that showcase the talented students that attend our school.

Josh: But context is exactly the point here. Our mascot may be old (for any number of reasons), but our context is consistently and relevantly new. A name that was once okay is not necessarily okay now. As a society we've changed, and many phrases and terms that were perfectly acceptable 50 or even 10 years ago are now recognized as inappropriate and inconsiderate.

Even if "Crusader" has a certain meaning on campus, that meaning shouldn't be expected to carry to all other contexts. How does "Crusader" impact people who know us by name only and not our actions? I respect tradition, but it's not enough to justify keeping a name that could make it harder for us to reach others.

Eric: But how many people are educated about the implication of the name? The issue might be a hot-button problem within our own close-knit community, but is it that much of a problem to the rest of Nampa? Or Idaho? The Nazarene community at large? Maybe the name isn't doing as much harm as we think it is and it doesn't require as much attention as we're giving it.

Josh: Even if people off-campus are less concerned than we are, it doesn't follow that there's no importance attached to the question. Not only does the name create tension on campus, but there's still the possibility that it will or does reflect on us negatively to the world at large.

Part of effective ministry is keeping the doors of relationship and communication open. It's not worth risking closing a door just so we can keep a name. Now I don't mean to imply that we can never offend anyone, because the Gospel itself will offend people at times, but something like a sports mascot ought not to be a way that we risk hurting other people and harming our reputation.

Eric: It seems to me like the majority of the problem is mostly in our own minds. It has the capacity to offend, but the issue needs to set a fire of action within those that care enough to cause a shift. Maybe someone should gather the necessary data to gauge how interested alumni and current students are in changing the name. Until an organized movement supported by the majority of the community presents a compelling case to change the name, things are likely to carry on as they have since the Crusader name was established.

Josh: Perhaps the issue does begin at home. I'd say that makes it even more important. I believe there have actually been efforts of some kind in the past to change, but we've never actually done so. However, I agree that until people start really pushing for change, this question will continue to cause little more than debate and conversation. Here's hoping that whatever happens, we can be a community that treats each other with respect, regardless of stance.

THE TRANSFER OF POWER

This past Tuesday marked the 58th presidential election since George Washington first became president in 1789. Lacking the overall unanimity that permeated Washington's election, however, the most recent witnessed the victory of President-elect Donald Trump with 279 electoral votes to Hillary Clinton's 228, with Clinton ahead in the popular vote .2% according to New York Times.

Tuesday's election proved to be a more fierce competition than many journalists and analysts were anticipating. Given Clinton's strong lead in the polls on Tuesday morning, many were stunned when several key states remained too close to call for several hours. The night took another unexpected turn as many of these states, such as Florida and Ohio, then went for Trump.

In addition to winning the presidency, the GOP also won the majorities in both houses of Congress, although their majority in the Senate was far from overwhelming. With the swell of passions that has accompanied this election season at every point, it makes sense that the aftermath of Election Day would be no less so. Many individuals continue to feel disillusioned towards the political process as a whole, and many more are dismayed by the prospects of such a radical realignment on the national level. No doubt sensing such powerful sentiments at play, Donald Trump, Hillary Clinton, and President Obama transcended their differences in an attempt to reassure individuals that a peaceful and respectful transition of power will indeed take place.

Upon conceding the election, Clinton reminded her supporters and Americans in general that "our constitutional democracy enshrines the peaceful transfer of power. And we don't just respect that, we cherish it."

After receiving word of his victory, Trump paid homage to Clinton's service to her country before stating that it is time "for America to bind the wounds of division...to all Republicans and Democrats and independents across this nation, I say it is time for us to come together as one united people."

He summarized his campaign as a "movement comprised of Americans from all races, religions, backgrounds and beliefs who want and expect our government to serve the people, and serve the people it will."

On Wednesday morning, President Obama weighed in to these sentiments of union by stating "We have to remember that we're actually all on one team...We're not Democrats first, we're not Republicans first, we are Americans first. We're patriots first. We all want what's best for this country."

"So I have instructed my team to follow the example that President Bush's team set eight years ago, and work as hard as we can to make sure that this is a successful transition for the President-elect -- because we are now all rooting for his success in uniting and leading the country. The peaceful transition of power is one of the hallmarks of our democracy. And over the next few months, we are 138 going to show that to the world."

THE SYRIAN CIVIL WAR

As many of you may know, there has been a civil war taking place in Syria since 2011 and has progressively become more violent. It began with protests against President Assad of Syria, and has escalated to involving regional and world powers. This war of four and a half years and counting has already killed over 250,000 people, half of whom are believed to have been innocent civilians.

All parties involved originally were those for or against President Assad, but now there is a Jihadist, Sunni, and Shia Alawite sect group, all of which are reportedly guilty of committing war crimes – murder, rape, torture, and enforced disappearances. As this violent war has progressed, so have the weapons being used and homemade chemical weapons have become increasingly more prevalent..

Due to this crisis, there have been billions of Syrians battling to flee the country and find safety. Since the start of the war, over 4.8 billion people have fled the country, making Syrians the world's largest refugee population under the United Nation's authority today. They are fleeing to the neighboring countries of Lebanon, Jordan, and Turkey, but struggle to even make a living there because there are just so many people. Those who are still residing in Syria are in desperate need of assistance.

According to the UN, it would require \$3.2 billion to help the 13.5 million people inside Syria who will need some form of humanitarian assistance. Six million of those people are children who don't have a choice in their living conditions. Approximately 70% of the Syrian population does not have access to good drinking water and one in three are not able to meet their basic dietary needs. RED, BLACK, AND GREEN: KEEPING NNU'S COST AND ENVIRONMENT FRIENDLY

If anything ever reminded you of the need for toilet paper, it was probably running out of it in a restroom one day. Hopefully you were lucky enough to be in a private restroom when this happened, but the experience probably left some imprint on your mind either way, as asking for additional TP is not a pleasant experience.

Thanks to Campus Facilities, however, this is a rare occurrence. Keeping restrooms stocked is a big job, understandably. According to Facilities Director Jade Anderson, NNU's community goes through about 1,030,000 linear feet of the stuff in just one month! That's approximately 516 ft per person.

This fact came out of a conversation seeking to find out how NNU evaluates its environmental impact, and also what we're doing to try and improve our practices. You may or not be aware of this, but NNU became Idaho's first Tree Campus back in 2015. This came with a certificate recognizing NNU's dedication to positive environmental change. As it turns out, our Facilities Director led the charge for bringing this effort to fruition, and is still actively working on it with other folks on campus such as Chaplains Dustin and Olivia Metcalf.

Tracking NNU's use of utilities such as water, gas, and electricity started in 2014, and every quarter the results are brought in a report between facilities and other campus officials, with the assistance of an energy consultant. These entities seek to evaluate not only how we could improve our impact, but also how we could reduce NNU's overhead by taking steps to cut waste.

One practical example of this is in our sprinkler systems. You may have noticed that sometimes campus sprinklers either flood the lawn, or miss it entirely by instead watering our sidewalks. Tracking this sort of thing in Idaho, which has comparatively pretty lax regulations for water usage, serves to help bring about solutions for making the campus beautiful while saving money, thus helping reduce the cost to students.

As we seek to install new buildings on campus, Facilities has looked for ways not only to make our new structures more eco-friendly and inexpensive to operate, but also for ways to retrofit those which we already have on campus. Retrofitting allows newer more efficient technology to be applied to structures made years ago, thus bypassing the need for a total overhaul while simultaneous-140 ly reaping the benefits of being up to date. For example, retrofitting would allow for the orange-lit lamps on campus to use the brighter LED technology that our lamps along the path to the Learning Commons now sport.

As it turns out, some of these efforts have already paid off. NNU has received over \$120,000 in rebates from Idaho Power just for our retrofitting and energy saving measures. Additionally, the roof of the Learning Commons features solar panels that are used to power some of its equipment, and the new, upcoming Student Center may do the same.

Facilities is prioritizing making our campus run cleaner and cheaper; so as students, how can we help? Well, the easiest step is not to litter. The time Facilities spends picking up after us is time spent away not only from basic maintenance, but also from retrofitting and other improvements, such as adjusting the sprinkler systems to avoid swamping our school.

As it turns out, there's also a committee for NNU's Tree Campus initiative that students can join, and there are other ways in which Facilities has opened an invitation to work directly with students. In fact, if you have a plan for improving NNU's environmental impact, you may be able to gain both staff and financial support from working with Facilities.
