

At last student opinion has been taken seriously as the college prepares for a new food service for the coming academic year. Students were given the priviledge and the responsibility to choose the food service that they preferred.

But there are other areas of noticeable improvement. With the new words "full accreditation" it is possible to make Trevecca more aluring to new students and new money. Potential application figures indicate a healthy enrollment for the 1970-71 year. A new financial campaign may also prove profitable. Additional qualified faculty members indicate a more balanced curriculum offering.

The big T-N-C planted at the flag pole indicates a general improvement in the esthetic value of the Trevecca grounds. For once the lawn mowers are attempting to keep up with the grass.

Further improvements in student services are also indicated. It is highly likely that at least some remodeling of the cafeteria will take place this summer. Also, a new apartment dorm is planned to aid expected over-crowded dorms and to aid married Trevecca students.

Also underway is Coach Representative Boner's "really big" basketball team recruitment. With a much larger basketball schedule and an expanding intercollegiate athletic program, there will be plenty happening for most sport enthusiasts.

Student quality is even improving. For once most Trevecca students were stimulated to do some thinking over the recent Kent State University incident. It's really refreshing to occasionally take the mind off the "Hill." And of course it must be said here, that an eager Student Government is developing to serve students with more complete effectiveness.

Just as the spring season brings new life to the earth and an air of hope, Trevecca may also be experiencing a spring season.
