November ASP luncheon speaker Dan Short is known for two things: One is love for telling the story of the birth of Christ. The other is his passion for neighborhood development.

He tells the Christmas story often dressed as Santa Claus and his telling of the story is

done in a way that even non-church-goers find intriguing.

Shortly after the owner of North Pole City, Oklahoma's largest Christmas shop (located just off I-44 at SW 41str St.) met Dan Short, he hired him as the first Santa Claus for the seasonal store. The Christmas part of Dan's life is featured on his website: <u>www.SantaDanShort.com</u>

The neighborhood development part started when Dan and his wife Gae moved into the North Highlands/ Estes Park neighborhoods. There, in what is considered one of Oklahoma City's economicallychallenged areas, they founded an inner-city not-forprofit ministry called Mustard Seed Development. They preached and modeled relationship building and caring about neighbors. While many achievements were realized with generous gifts and donated labor, the hallmark of Mustard Seed's efforts has been "modeling and teaching neighbors how to be 'good neighbors' to each other." OETA, Oklahoma's Public Television Station, broadcast a video titled "Santa's Mustard Seeds" --<u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=2rDf7qUCvm4</u>. It was filmed in 2009 at North Pole City and at the Short's home.

Dan is now pursuing an acting career and finding other things to write about after coauthoring his first book, *The Santa Claus Chronicles, Heartwarming Tales From A Real-Life Santa,* with Rene Gutteridge. That



book was published this fall by Harvest House Publishers.

The "SNU Connections" moment at the November ASP luncheon will feature an interview with Dr. Timothy Eades, SNU's new provost.

Dr. Eades arrived at SNU this fall after serving four years at Trevecca Nazarene University (Nashville, TN) as its Associate Provost and Executive Vice President of Graduate and Continuing Studies.

Prior to that, Dr. Eades served from 2010-2014 as an assistant provost and vice-president at Ohio Christian University in Circleville, Ohio. From 1994 to 1996, Eades was the Assistant Director of Student Recruitment at Mount Vernon Nazarene University before returning to a ministry position and later working as a financial advisor. He returned to MVNU in 2003 and served in three positions: Director of Admissions and Student Recruitment, Executive Director of Enrollment Services and Marketing, and Associate Vice President for Adult and Graduate Studies.

Dr. Eades is an ordained elder in the Church of the Nazarene. Originally from Virginia, he earned a Bachelor's in religion from Trevecca, a Master of Ministry from Mount Vernon Nazarene University and an EdD in ethical leadership from Olivet Nazarene University.

Over the past decade, he has served as a consultant for three small firms devoted to Christian higher education. Eades' teaching interests include courses in leadership, organizational change, ministry, and marketing.

Dr. Tim Eades is married to Dr. Kimberly Eades. Their daughter Grace is a freshman film studies major at Trevecca while daughters Devin and Alison and granddaughter Jada all live in the Dayton, Ohio area.

*Book Discussion* by Barbara Culbertson

We started off our book discussion this year with a nonfiction book by ASP member Dale German. In November we will discuss the fiction offering of another author familiar to ASP members, history and ethics professor John Dwyer.



Dwyer's excitement about his subject makes him a popular teacher. Amazon's accolade piques one's interest: "[His books] have built for him a large following of readers appreciative of his poignant, gritty, often inspiring style" (<u>tinyurl.com/y4paohz3</u>, accessed 10/7/19). When the Bluebonnets Come is set in contemporary Texas, when trauma interrupts the idyllic life of a young preacher's daughter. Dealing with multiple ordeals and pain, "she begins to learn that courage, loyalty, and honor are more than words--and . . . sometimes come with a high price."



Our book discussion will skip December, and resume in January with a fiction tome, *Angel Sister* by Ann Gabhart. The middle of three girls growing up during the Depression, the main character Kate works to keep her family grounded. Her father enlisted in

WWI just after he and her mother, recently out of high school, got married. He returns scarred, and turns to alcohol. Kate finds a gypsy child who had been left in the woods, her parents unable to care for her. The drama that ensues threatens to further destroy family relationships, but also provides the possibility of healing.

These two books are available on Amazon, in both book and Kindle editions. *Angel Sister* is also available at the library. Come join us at 9:30 in the third-floor President's Dining Room!
