An Advertisement of Christ!

SOME TIME AGO an employee of a firm in Texas gave me two significant quotations which her company had posted in its place of business. They read as follows: "Every member of an organization who in any capacity comes in contact with the public is a salesman, and the impression he makes is an advertisement, good or bad"; and, "An institution may spread itself over the entire world and may employ a hundred thousand men, but the average person will usually form his judgment of it through his contact with one individual. If this person is rude or inefficient, it will take a lot of kindness and efficiency to overceme the bad impression." What a responsibility the truth of these two quotations places upon every employee of any business firm! Likewise, it suggests that every professed follower of Christ is placed in as serious a situation.

The person who claims to be a Christian is a living advertisement of Christ and the church to which he belongs. He will be the measure of Christ and the church for some. There will be people pointed to or away from Christ and the church by his life. This will be the case when you are not on dress parade as well as when you are. You are a representative of Christ and the church all of the time. There is a very real sense in which you are on duty just as much when you do not intend to be as you are when you intend to be. What kind of an advertisement of Christ and the church are you?

Recently a businessman in another state—not a member of the Church of the Nazarene—wrote and stated that he was not renewing his subscription to the Herald of Holiness. He gave the following reason: "A member of your church wrote my firm a childish and spiteful letter." I cannot say for sure that the charge was valid, but there must have been some reason for it. What kind of advertisement of Christ and the church are you?

"Showers of Blessing"

Glances Backward from Its Fifth Milestone

ROM five years of experience in airing "Showers of Blessing" the church should be in a position to evaluate its effectiveness and

more perfectly chart its future course.

Increase in Station Outlets. The May 2, 1949, issue of the HERALD OF HOLINESS carried the story of our radio ministry to our fourth anniversary. At that time 195 stations were carrying our program, and of that number 48 were carrying it without charge. Today "Showers of Blessing" is going forth from 286 stations, 127 of which carry it free. These figures speak for themselves and need no commentary.

Major Factors Behind our Program. Our deep gratitude goes to God, whose guiding hand has led us by an untried way and difficult passages to the position we now hold in the field of religious broadcasting.

From the very beginning the church and its leaders have been sympathetic, patient, and cooperative. Through the generous support of the church and our friends we celebrate our fifth birthday with a peak audience coverage, a great store of listener and station good will, and with no unmet financial obligations.

A large share of credit for the progress made is due to those who have prepared and rendered the program. A number of speakers have made valuable contributions, but the major portion of the speaking has been done by Dr. Russell V. DeLong, whose logical, spiritual, and gripping messages have from the very beginning caught the ears and touched the hearts of our own people and many of other ranks.

Mr. Ray Moore and his choir, the organist, pianist, and narrators have been faithful and efficient, while Mr. Whitcanack—our studio director—has ably arranged and directed the production.

Station managers and program directors, noting the high quality of production and religious tone of "Showers of Blessing," have been generous with free time, which has made our progress more marked. Some station managers have written us as follows:

Indiana—"'Showers of Blessing' is a beautiful program and may I extend my congratulations to you and your staff."

Vermont—"You will be interested to know that we have received only very favorable comments relative to 'Showers of Blessing.'"

Texas—"We enjoyed the program; it was well produced, and in every way a good series."

Missouri—"The members of our radio staff feel that there is a need for more programs of this caliber and we're happy to say, 'Count us in on it.'"

We are thoroughly convinced that radio men are not opposed to religious programs if they are conducted on a high ethical level.

Benefits Derived from Broadcast. Radio has given to the church a new channel for sending forth the gospel message in song and sermon, and God has assured us that His Word will not return void. There is ample proof of the fact that a radio gospel ministry yields spiritual dividends of high value.

The week-by-week broadcasts strengthen the hands of our local pastors and people, and place our church before the community in a very acceptable manner. Thousands hear our message and learn of our work who would never come to know us.

Sorrowing and lonely souls, sick and shut-ins, parents who must stay at home with children or the sick, as well as careless and indifferent people who never go to the house of God, have an opportunity to hear a gospel message. Some wayward ones will be convicted and brought to God, and multitudes of needy hearts will be blessed. Thus the church supplements its pulpit ministry in a very practical way.

Another phase of our radio work is with the veterans in national hospitals. Thousands of these war-torn boys have our radio ministry brought to them each week. This is a special form of service in addition to our regular radio broadcast.

The briefest survey of the blessings and benefits derived from our national broadcast lead us to conclude that it is a worth-while service and a valuable investment.

You can have a human religion of almost any kind you want. You can choose one of the many already here; or, if no one of these suits exactly, or if you desire a place of profit or prominence which can come to one who starts a new cult, you can invent one of your own.

But you cannot have God's religion—salvation—on your own terms. You must accept His terms!—Selected.



"Showers of Blessing" Heard Around the World

UR Nazarene international broadcast. "Showers of Blessing, actually heard around the world. It is now released over the

following stations outside continental United States: In Canada—Calgary, Alberta; Dawson Creek, Kelowna, Vancouver, and Nahaimo, British Columbia; Kentville and Windsor, Nova Scotia; Prince Albert, Regina, Saskatoon, and Yorkton, Saskatchewan; Quebec City, Quebec; Summerside, Prince Edward Island; and Winnipeg, Manitoba. Overseas—Adelaide, Brisbane, Melbourne, Murwillumbah, Port Augusta, and Towoomba in Australia; two in Anchorage, Alaska; Aricebo, Mayaquez, and San Juan in Puerto Rico; Bridgetown, Barbados; Honolulu, Hawaii; two in Manila, Philippines; three in Panama City, Panama; Trinidad, Port of Spain; Radio Goa, Portuguese, India; Lourenco Marques, Africa; and Quito, Ecuador.

In addition to the above the program is heard across national boundaries in scores of adjacent countries. For several years "Showers of Blessing" has been short-waved from HCJB Quito, Ecuador, each week-this station has literally girdled the globe. The radio office has heard from numerous listeners in many countries who have picked up clearly the HCJB release.

On my recent world tour it was my privilege to visit several radio stations over which "Showers of Blessing" has been broadcast. In Honolulu, Hawaii, I spoke twice over KULA, the most powerful station in the Islands. Our program is heard by tens of thousands of people there. In company with Dr. L. J. Du Bois we held "Showers of Blessing" rallies. In the southernmost and largest island, Hawaii Island, we visited the interior, where the audience was made up primarily of natives. To my amazement 60 per cent of those present held up their hands signifying that they heard "Showers of Blessing."

In Australia our program has been on four stations for two or three years, and recently the fifth and sixth were added, Adelaide and Port Augusta. Everywhere I went I met many people who are regular listeners. The district superintendent, Rev. A. A. E. Berg, told me personally that "Showers of Blessing" was the biggest single factor in bringing the gospel of holiness and the Church of the Nazarene to Australia. In Brisbane I met a Catholic woman who had listened

to "Showers of Blessing," got down by her radio and was converted, found the address of the Church of the Nazarene, and joined our church. I had not been in Melbourne, the queen city of Australia, more than thirty minutes before the telephone in my hotel room rang and the officials of 3XY were requesting an interview. I sat around a table with two of the head men of that station and answered questions concerning the Church of the Nazarene, the Nazarene Theological Seminary, the Radio League, United States, etc. An electrical transcription was made on a fifteen-minute platter and released at eight o'clock the next night with an advertisement in Melbourne's largest newspaper announcing the program-all paid for by the radio station. Without doubt "Showers of Blessing" is one of the most popular radio programs in Australia, if not the most popular. People drove for many miles to my campaigns who had heard our release over one of the stations.

'Showers of Blessing" can be picked up in the Orient either through local stations or HCJB. It is heard in the Philippines, Japan, South and Central America, Africa, and North America.

District Superintendent C. H. Strickland and Dr. Lauren Seaman give us a most remarkable account of the first preacher and the first Church of the Nazarene in the Union of South Africa as a result of "Showers of Blessing." The "Africa Evangelistic Band" asked permission to reprint the six sermons on "Christian Perfection." Here are some excerpts from letters:

JOHANNESBURG—"I was saved listening to your broadcast, and I am just waiting when the time comes when you can get a place here in Johannesburg to put up a church.'

GATOOMA, SOUTHERN RHODESIA-"It was your program that brought me back to the Lord almost six months ago, for which I praise God."

WOODSTOCK, CAPETOWN-"I was much interested and wish a copy of the broadcast."

CAPETOWN-"My family and I are very interested in the gospel messages given over the radio tonight's message was so helpful and gave us plenty of food for thought."

POTGIETIESNEST, TRANSVAAL—"I deeply appreciate these services."

WEST KRUGERSDORP-"Will you kindly let me have particulars about the Church of the Nazarene in South Africa?'

The pale pins are locations of veterans' hospitals using the program, and the slightly smaller pins are stations that carried the Palm Sunday and Easter programs only.

Over four hundred radio outlets carried the story of a triumphant Christ and risen Lord into the homes of millions on Palm Sunday and Easter. Our regular stations number 286, including 14 in Canada and 22 overseas. This represents a phenomenal growth from the 37 stations we started on just five years ago.


The future presents a tremendous challenge. With approximately one hundred million people residing in the coverage zones in the United States and Canada, and many more millions added in other areas of the world, the Church of the Nazarene stands in a very responsible position to get the gospel into the hearts of all of these.

It is not enough to get the program on the air. It is our combined task to get the people to listen, get them into the churches, get them saved and sanctified, and enlisted in the glorious Mid-Century Crusade for Souls.

"Showers of Blessing" is now being broadcast regularly from forty-five cities in the United States and Canada where we have no Church of the Nazarene. In thirty-five of these cities the radio stations are donating the air time. What a challenge for home missionary work!

Along with this challenge comes the responsibility to do something about it. Into the homes and hearts of thousands the gospel of full salvation is being proclaimed. Doors are opening—prejudices are being swept away and hearts are becoming increasingly hungry for someone who cares to pray with them and lead them to a forgiving Saviour. They need a spiritual church home and the care of a godly pastor.

The radio voice of the Church of the Nazarene is challenged to continue and increase its service of giving spiritual food to thousands of shut-ins and elderly people for whom the sun of life is setting. So often the lonely hours are brightened and faith is restored by the "messages of hope with songs that cheer." Many tell us the brightest spot of the week is when Ray Moore and the



choir sing their way into their rooms and Doctor DeLong encourages their faith with words of inspiration and blessing. The invalids, the crippled, the aged, the sick and shut-in constitute a great parish of souls we must not neglect.

All of the activities and efforts of the radio work can be made more effective and useful in every coverage area by increasing the listening audience. The more who listen-the more who will receive help, the more friends for the church, the more we can lead to a closer walk with God. Remember, every friend of "Showers of Blessing" in your community is a friend of your church. The mail brings us letters of appreciation from ministers and members of many denominations, saying they look forward each week to "Showers of Blessing" for just the spiritual lift they need to help them preach or teach a Sunday-school class or otherwise serve Christ better. Invite your neighbor to tune in. It won't cost a cent more and it might do an eternity of good.

The future challenges us to be grateful to those who help us. Doctor Willingham, our executive director, reported to the General Board in January that at that time for every dollar we spent in production and overhead for "Showers of Blessing" the radio station men donated over two dollars in free time or reduced rates. We should be grateful—you should be grateful. A card or letter of appreciation to your local station men will gladden their hearts and help guarantee continued favors. Just twelve penny postal cards sent to a station following a sample broadcast got the program on permanently without any charge for air time. It pays to be grateful—try it!

We solicit your prayers and co-operation as together we accept these challenges to minister to hungry men and women in their homes, in their autos, and in church.

were red letter days in our radio ministry. Some months ago we offered free transcriptions of these two programs to radio stations not regularly carrying "Showers of Blessing" if they would air them as a public service feature. As a result of this offer more than a hundred stations carried our message for those two Sundays. Thus, "Showers of Blessing" was heard from more than four hundred stations on Palm Sunday and Easter.

This venture proved to be valuable in other ways. Some stations suggested a willingness to use other such special messages while others, having become acquainted with our radio ministry, have requested permission to carry our program regularly without cost to us. In this way we have added twenty stations.

Following this plan, we hope to have a wide coverage for "Showers of Blessing" Christmas and New Year's.

Others could do it with profit.

Be Ye Holy!

Be ye holy, for I am holy (I Peter 1:16).

GOD in His omnipresent, omnipotent, and omniscient existence is essentially, expressively, excellently, exemplarily, exquisitely, and everlastingly holy. "Holy, holy, holy, is the Lord of hosts." "Holy, holy, holy, Lord God Almighty!" He sits on a holy throne, in a holy heaven, holds in His right hand a holy scepter and wields it with universal and everlasting sovereignty. He is the holy Father. His only begotten Son is "holy, harmless, undefiled, separate from sinners, and made higher than the heavens."

The Spirit of God is holy. He is God the Spirit, whose operations are all holy, as the immediate divine Representative in this present dispensation. Holy, holy, holy: God holy, God the Son holy, God the Spirit holy. God's name is holy; "For thus saith the high and lofty One that inhabiteth eternity, whose name is Holy; I dwell in the high and holy place" (Isa. 57:15). His nature is holy: "The holy one of Israel," a phrase used so frequently in the Old Testament. God's Word is holy: "The holy Scriptures," "the holy Bible." (See Rom. 1:2; II Tim. 3:15.) His works are holy (Ps. 145:17). Unfallen angels are holy (Matt. 25:31). His covenant is holy (Luke 1:72); prophets were holy (Acts 3:21); apostles were holy (Eph. 3:5); there is a way that is holy, "The way of holiness" (Isa. 35:8); and there are holy people (Isa. 62:12).

God's person is holy, His place is holy, His purposes are holy. His properties are holy, His peculiar and purified people are holy. He is holy in His will, holy in His ways, holy in His Word, and holy in His works. God calls us to holiness, and commands us to be holy, and communicates His holiness to all completely consecrated souls, and He commends the incomparable quality to all. "As he which hath called you is holy, so be ye holy in all manner of conversation" (I Peter 1:15). "For God hath not called us unto uncleanness, but unto holiness" (I Thess. 4:7; II Tim. 1:9). Antecedently to effectual calling there is election, and it is an election to holiness: "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ: according as he hath chosen us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before him in love" (Eph. 1:3-4). Elect according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, through sanctification of the Spirit, unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ" (I Peter 1:2). "Elect of God, holy and beloved."

We are to be holy. We are to serve God in holiness (Luke 1:74-75); our fruit must be unto

holiness (Rom. 6:22); we must lift up "holy hands" (I Tim. 2:8); we are to "worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness" (Ps. 29:2); we are to present our "bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God" (Rom. 12:1). God can make us holy in "spirit and soul and body" (I Thess. 5:23). Do we see our calling, brethren? Do we believe and behave as becometh holiness?

Is the word holiness the mere shibboleth of a shallow, shady, shaky, and shabby profession and experience with us? Or does the true and entire sanctification characterize our life and labor in a complete and commendable manner? Do we really realize the religious significance of the term? Or are we pharisaically, nay, farcically, trifling with sacred phraseology, and knowing very little experimentally of its tremendous import and power? May we bring no reproach upon the fine reputation of holiness by flippant repetition. Let us not abuse terms. Let us not drag the standard through the dust and mire of degrading affectations. Are we justifying our existence? Are we a credit to our cause? Or are we ready to die, with only a name that we live?

We are to be holy, as God is holy—not holy absolutely, independently and superlatively, as He is holy. But what is essence in Him must be a quality in us. We are to be "partakers of his holiness." God imparts to us His holy nature, and removes entirely what is sinful from our human nature. The remains of moral depravity must be removed before we can be holy as God is holy. He is the standard, and, bless the Lord, His is our sufficiency for all manner of holy conversation (life and conduct), which is the scope. Our whole being must be holy. No more is commanded than this as to outward life and inward principle. Nothing else will do, nothing less. Bless the Lord who is able, so abundantly able, and so willing to sanctify us wholly. Hallelujah!

God does not command the impossible. He does not demand of us that which is unobtainable, unattainable, and unmaintainable. He does not bring before us a mere lofty maxim, or a beautiful ideal, or a pious sentiment, or an oratorical fancy, or a hyperbolic exaggeration. He presents to us a glorious possibility, something that can be bountifully realized. Whatever we may have inherited hereditarily, whatever grip some base ancestors may have upon our nature, and whatever may be our circumstances—God can make and keep us holy here, now and forever. Let there be no compromise, no camouflage, no cowardliness. May the Almighty deliver us from an accursed, morally antagonistic antinomianism, and make us people who will keep His holy commandments perpendicularly toward Him, and horizontally toward our neighbor.

Oh, for a holiness that will operate centrifugally and centripetally, celestially and secularly (or materially), up and down, like Jacob's ladder, ascending to God after descending from Him, and then condescending to the lowest with soulabsorbing interest in their uttermost salvation.

"Think on These Things"

"The need of the hour is not for men and women who are anxious to do some great thing, but for men to keep their eyes open for the chance to do little things. Every community has those in it who are doing nothing simply because 'the big chance' does not come their way. The man who really counts in this life is not the man who sits around waiting for a job that is big enough, nor the man who thinks how well he could do some bit of heroism if the chance arose, but the man who actually does the humdrum, workaday, everyday duties as these duties arise."

When the big chance comes, the worker most likely to take the advantage of it is not the one who professed to be waiting for it, but one of the persons who has been content to do the small things well. You are always sure of employment if you do the little things, for there is always an opportunity to do the little things, and that is all the most of us are capable of doing. There are not many ten-talent men; most of us have but one talent. Jesus said the small things would not go unnoticed nor unrewarded. Give a cup of cold water in His name; it will not lose its reward. Never a day passes that I do not have an opportunity to minister a "cup offering," and there are many of them. There is the cup of sympathy, the cup of appreciation, the cup of gentle tones, the cup of cheery greetings, and the cup of helpfulness.

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Too much time should not be wasted in seeking the superior fields or waiting for an oppor-

tunity to do the big thing. Take the thing that lies nearest at hand; for it may prove to be the opening of the door to larger and richer fields. If you wait for the opportunity of some big thing to present itself, you will be idle most of the time. Don't be afraid to do the little thing or to take the little place. If you are worthy of bigger things, ultimately they will come to you.

Henry Ward Beecher began his unique career in a little church in a Western village at a salary of \$250 per year. Even that small sum was paid in part by turnips, cabbages, and onions. He began there, but he did not stop there. He began with a small church of nineteen members, but he ended with a church of more than twenty-five hundred members.

Form the habit of promptness. Learn well the lesson—which some people never seem to learn—of being on time. One of the sins of the business world is tardiness. If you are working for a big corporation, you soon will learn that you must be there on time or you won't be there at all. Coming in late has cost many a man his position. It may be that you never knew why you were discharged. It was not because you were profane, not because you drank, not because you pilfered from the till—but solely because every morning you were at your post of duty ten minutes behind time.

Your value to anybody, whether it be to your boss, the public, the school, the church, or your friends, is a matter of dependability and dependability is a matter of being there when you are expected. Show me a young man who is always late to school, to church, to work, and to meals, and I will show you a young man who is a failure for both worlds. Likewise, show me a young man who is always on time for school, at work, for his meals, and to church, and I'll show you a young man who will be a success.

All night long they kept up endless races from one end of the room to the other, vying with one another to see which could swoop the nearest to our heads without getting caught in our hair. One got into Miss Jes-

ter's bed between the covers, and we had quite a time ousting it. However, it was an unusually good meeting, and we enjoyed it very much in spite of the bats and other minor inconveniences.

At this meeting the native women and girls slept in the tent. One night about midnight a terrific wind came up, and we were fearful lest the tent should be blown down and several people hurt. At first there seemed to be panic outside, loud talking, shouting, etc. Then one of the faithful old saints of God took things in hand and shouted, "Makholwa (Believers), stop your shouting and let us pray. God will take care of us." In a few minutes in answer to their believing prayers the storm subsided, and they settled down again for the rest of the night.—DOROTHY BEVILL, Africa.

ALASKA NEWS

A T NOME in the frozen north, it snowed on Easter Sunday. This message comes from Rev. Lewis I. Hudgins, our missionary at Nome:

"Several times through the day there was fluffy snow to remind us of the One who arose to wash us whiter than the snow. Our Sundayschool attendance broke all records with 114 present, and 125 attended the Easter program. There were thirty out for the N.Y.P.S. service and the evening worship service. We dedicated one baby and baptized three children. The presence of the Lord was very near as we worshiped in meditation on the true meaning of Easter. The Easter offering was \$70. for which we rejoice in the privilege of giving for the One who gave so much for us."

Our church at Anchorage, organized in January, set a new record in attendance with seventy-six present in Sunday school on Easter. They gave \$104 in the Easter offering for missions. They are now entering a

building fund campaign in which they hope to raise \$5,000 to assist in securing their own church building. They now worship in a rented hall. Rev. M. R. Korody is doing a splendid work as pastor of this young church.

NEW CHURCHES

Superintendent Mack Anderson has organized a new church on the Georgia District. A group of holiness people have been worshiping for some time at Wilders Tower, not connected with any church. Rev. A. F. Chappin was asked to preach for them. After he became familiar with the people, he suggested they join the Church of the Nazarene. They voted unanimously to do so. Brother Anderson held a short meeting, at the conclusion of which he organized the church with fourteen charter members and others to come in later. They are averaging above fifty in Sunday school and have a nice 30' x 70' chapel, including some Sundayschool rooms, completely furnished and free of debt. called Jasher is mentioned. What is this book and what does it teach? Are there any copies of it in existence today?

A. The book of Jasher, or Jashar, is referred to also in Joshua 10:13. It is probably a book of poetry with a prose introduction and conclusion. In 1751 a volume appeared which claimed to be an English translation of this book, but it has not been accepted as genuine. Therefore, this book is not in existence today, as far as anyone knows.

Q. I am a member of a church which up until a few years ago was a holiness church. However, for the past six years it has been pastored by modernistic preachers who have no more revivals, prayer meetings, and no souls born into the kingdom of God. The attendance has dropped to half of what it was, and there is very little interest in spiritual things any more, but increased attention is given to suppers and worldly enterprises. Should I continue to belong to and attend this church and give my money into it, since it is very near where I live and my family thinks that I should; or should I move my membership to a holiness church seven miles away, which I can attend only part of the time? In the latter church my money would really count for something for time and eternity.

A. You have all but answered your own question. Like you, I cannot see any value in belonging to and attending a church which does not stand for what I believe in. I do not support other organizations which I do not believe in, and, therefore, why should I support a church that is not

Q. In Second Samuel 1:18 a book teaching the truth as I see it? I would join and support the holiness church and go to it whenever it is nossible.

> Q. In the light of God's Word. would it be worse for me to sell tobacco and liquor for a profit to support my family, or for my son and daughter to handle the same for a salary to spend on themselves?

> A. The Manual of the Church of the Nazarene holds that it would be worse for you to sell tobacco in a business of your own than it would be for your son and daughter to sell it in a business which they did not own; and I judge that this is what you mean by your question. I also believe that according to the teaching of the Bible it would be worse for you to sell tobacco in a business which you own than for them to sell it in a business which they do not own. And even as to liquor, I cannot help but believe that the owner of the business where it is sold in any form is more responsible before God than the man who is just working for him. Of ourse, I do not believe that anvone should work in a place where either is the major product held for sale. Society is getting so complex and sin is creeping in from so many angles that it is not easy today to follow Christ. If one really is going with the lowly Nazarene, he will have to have plenty of courage.

Q. What does it mean in Matthew 8:22 when Jesus says: "Follow me; and let the dead bury their dead"?

A. There is an urgency about the work of the Master which will not tolerate any delay or rivalry. This (Continued on page 14)

Dr. Wiley Defines

Entire Sanctification

DR. H. O. WILEY, president-emeritus of Pasadena College, gives us a comprehensive definition of entire sanctification. He says: "Entire sanctification is that act of God, subsequent to regeneration, by which believers are made free from original sin, or depravity, and brought into

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a state of entire devotement to God, and the holy obedience of love made perfect. It is wrought by the baptism with the Holy Spirit, and comprehends in one experience the cleansing of the heart from sin and the abiding, indwelling presence of the Holy Spirit, empowering the believer for life and service. Entire sanctification is provided by the blood of Jesus, is wrought instantaneously by faith, preceded by entire consecration; and to this work and state of grace the Holy Spirit bears witness" (Christian Theology, Vol. II, p. 466). The truths set forth in this definition may be emphasized as follows:

- 1. Entire sanctification is an "act of God." It is something that God and not man does. No man can sanctify himself. "And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly" (I Thess. 5:23).
- 2. This crisis is a second blessing—it comes "subsequent to regeneration." Only those who have been saved can get it. "They are not of the world, even as I am not of the world. Sanctify them through thy truth: thy word is truth" (John 17:16-17).
- 3. Entire sanctification frees the believer from original sin, or depravity. Every man belongs to a fallen race—he is born in sin, but is freed from this sin-nature when he is sanctified wholly. "For if we have been planted together in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection: knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin. For he that is dead is freed from sin" (Rom. 6:5-7).
- 4. At the same time that this experience frees from the sin-nature, it brings the one who receives it "into a state of entire devotement to God, and the holy obedience of love made perfect." "Herein is our love made perfect, that we may have boldness in the day of judgment: because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love; but perfect love casteth out fear: because fear hath torment. He that feareth is not made perfect in love" (I John 4:17-18).
- 5. Entire sanctification "is wrought by the baptism with the Holy Spirit"—"And God, which knoweth the hearts, bare them witness, giving them the Holy Ghost, even as he did unto us; and put no difference between us and them, purifying their hearts by faith" (Acts 15:8-9). (See also Matt. 3:11-12.)
- 6. It "comprehends in one experience the cleansing of the heart from sin and the abiding, indwelling presence of the Holy Spirit." "But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood

of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin" (I John 1:7). "And I will pray the Father, and he shall give you another Comforter, that he may abide with you for ever; even the Spirit of truth; whom the world cannot receive, because it seeth him not, neither knoweth him: but ye know him; for he dwelleth with you, and shall be in you" (John 14:16-17).

- 7. The believer is empowered "for life and service" by the abiding Holy Spirit. "But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth" (Acts 1:8).
- 8. "Entire sanctification is provided by the blood of Jesus." "Wherefore Jesus also, that he might sanctify the people with his own blood, suffered without the gate" (Heb. 13:12). "Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it; that he might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word, that he might present it to himself a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish" (Eph. 5:25-27).
- 9. This experience "is wrought instantaneously by faith." In that great passage in Acts 26:15-19, Paul tells King Agrippa the purpose for which God called him; and in the closing words of the eighteenth verse he says that we are sanctified by faith that is in Christ. John Wesley rightly declares that if we are sanctified by works, it takes time; but if it comes by faith, it can and does take place instantly.
- 10. Just as justification and regeneration are preceded by repentance, so consecration must come before and lay the foundation for entire sanctification. "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service" (Rom. 12:1).
- 11. Finally, Dr. Wiley says: "And to this work and state of grace the Holy Spirit bears witness." "For by one offering he hath perfected for ever them that are sanctified. Whereof the Holy Ghost also is a witness to us: for after that he had said before, This is the covenant that I will make with them after those days, saith the Lord, I will put my laws into their hearts, and in their minds will I write them; and their sins and iniquities will I remember no more" (Heb. 10:14-17).

Entire sanctification is the rich heritage which God has provided for every believer. Why not take advantage of it right now?

The King of the Ages

WEYMOUTH translates Paul's outburst of praise in I Timothy 1:17 thus: "Now to the immortal and invisible King of the Ages, who alone is God, be honor and glory to the Ages of the Ages! Amen." The King of the Ages! Our God is the Creator of the Ages—time was born out of His soul. He is the Sustainer of the Ages—time flows from His soul moment by moment, as the light radiates from the sun. He is the Ruler of the Ages—He will finally bend their will to His.

Our God is the Dictator Supreme; but His dictatorship is holy—perfectly balanced between justice and love. He demands and will ultimately have control over all, but this sovereignty will be based on an infinite wisdom and an absolute goodness. It has no kinship with the selfish dictatorships of this world.

The King of the Ages! His kingdom is without end, and His rule will never be displaced. He is the King immortal, or incorruptible—without decay or disintegration. Kingdoms come and go, and governments rise and fall. We live in the land of the ephemeral, the passing, the changing, the temporal. The shadows fall and the night comes on—day is done. A few hours pass and streaks of light begin to appear in the east, and soon the sun has arisen and night is no more.

Yesterday the man was a boy at his mother's knee; today he is swiftly moving down the western slope of life. A few weeks ago the trees were crowded with leaves, and their gay rustle could be heard in the warm breezes; today those same trees are bare and dead-like, as the wintry winds sweep through them. "Change and decay in all around I see." There is but one Master of the Ages—the only God, Creator, Sustainer, and Ruler. His kingdom will never end, and He will ever sit upon the throne thereof.

Again, God is the invisible King of the Ages. Invisibility, for Paul, was another name, not only for the eternal, but also for the real. The things that are seen are not merely temporal, they are unreal in the ultimate sense. If we tie to them or depend upon them, they will finally prove to be insubstantial. We can rely upon Him. He will not disappoint our fondest hopes and highest values.

The immortal and invisible King of the Ages is the only God. There is no other God beside Him. He is the only Person who can meet the test of Godhood. He alone is the supremely wise, powerful, and good Person. Come, let us adore Him! He alone is worthy of honor and glory to the Ages of the Ages! "Now to the immortal and invisible King of the Ages, who alone is God, be honor and glory to the Ages of the Ages! Amen."

She told me that she used to buy butter from my mother. It seems that every time she came for the butter, she noticed the pounds were full and overweight. One day she said to Mother: "Why do you make your pounds of butter so large?"

And this was the reply, "Because that's the last time I want to see those pounds of butter."

At first I tried to think how anyone would see a pound of butter after it had been sold and taken away from the home, and then it dawned upon me. My mother did not want to see the pounds of butter in her mind's eyes. She wanted her memory to be clear of any shortchanging or short-weighting in the case of the butter.

But, then, we could carry that thought on. If we were as careful of what we say and what we do all of the time as my mother was of the weight of her pounds of butter, I wonder if we would ever have remorse and regrets. I honestly believe that if we would weigh carefully what we say, if we would always do the "big" thing by our friends, we could face ourselves and our neighbors with clear eyes and clear consciences.

How "big" have you been recently? Do you short-weight just a little bit? Are you willing to do the "over and above" what is expected in order never to see the transaction again?

"What a little thing to remember a woman by, just the way she measured and sold butter!" you say. If you think a bit I'm sure you will be convinced that one who never short-

weights a pound of butter is not apt to short-weight her friends and neighbors.

It's so wonderful to know people who do the extras—the unnecessary things, unexpected and unrequired. I believe God must especially rejoice when He sees one of His children do the "over and above."

HEN WE were traveling through Texas, there were many, many rivers and creeks with no bridges over them. What would you do today if you were riding down the highway and suddenly came to a wide, wide river bed where there was no ferry nor bridge in sight? We were all so anxious that we pause not for even a brief moment. And we didn't either. I remember our looking at each other and with understanding eyes saying, "This old Ford better not choke up now."

I'm sure we breathed real prayers, for all of us believed with all our hearts that God was right there with us and that He would hear our prayers. But I couldn't help seeing a horrible picture before my eyes. Say, for instance, we would have to stop and then slowly the car would start down, down and all of us would go with it. Of course we could get out of the car, and if we kept running after we got out we could still make it.

When we see some of the evils and notice that our schoolmates are doing these wrong things, we sometimes are a bit tempted to stick our feet out into the beautiful sand. It is hard to believe that quicksand would be so cruel as to swallow you up and not even leave a piece of you sticking out. But that's the way the old worldly sins are, too. They are ready to swallow you up and, before you know it, you cannot get loose.

You go deeper and deeper into sin, and the deeper you go the harder it is to get out and even to see out. THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL LESSON

Topic for May 21: Micah's Plea for Human Rights Scripture: Micah 1:1: 2:1-2: 3:5-12: 6:6-8

GOLDEN TEXT—He hath shewed thee, O man, what is good; and what doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God? (Micah 6:8).

Micah stands atop the hills of Judah with his hands cupped to his mouth, and he cries like the wail of a police-siren, "Woe! Woe!" It's "Woe" to the aggressors in the pew and also it is "Woe" to the wicked aggression in the pulpit.

In the life of this rugged prophet from Moresheth, courage was spelled with a capital "C." He was afraid of no man, priest or worshiper. He hit out at the prophets—false prophets—who "make my people err," who "bite with their teeth." Oh, the biting irony of his words! Not only were they leading the nation into

darkness morally; they also were open to bribery—selling the influence of their sacred offices. Micah also blasted away at heartless landowners who coveted fields and robbed people even of their vineyards. The tragedy of the awful hour! People went to the sanctuary and were robbed of their spiritual security; they returned home to find that their very economic security had been stolen.

Micah seethed inside as he saw the wrongs; then he boiled his message down into one undying sentence. In 6:8 he lists the trinity of virtues that God honors: and it is noteworthy that he places "justice" at the very head of the list.





Alabama District Preachers' Meeting



Nebraska District Church Schools

In a beautiful and blessed service, with which the assembly came to a close, Sergio Franco was ordained as an elder.




